What We Learned Today at the Historical Village

Today your student visited the Sylvania Historical Village for a field trip. They toured the village and got to experience different aspects of Pioneer life. Below is an outline of what they learned and questions and activities you can ask them to further reinforce and engage with the day they had today.

Log Home life

We discussed how our houses today compare to a log home. We also talked about and participated in a few common chores (Butter Making, and Gardening) that would need to be done in a log home.

Ask your student: What was different in the log home compared to our house?

One Room School House

We visited the Stone Academy and experienced how school was different in 1844. **Ask your student:** The school building is a replica, what does replica mean?

Transportation

We saw the original Sylvania Train Depot and talked about the importance of transportation and how people can get from place to place.

Ask your student: Why was the train an important mode of transportation?



Artifacts

We learned that artifacts are objects from long ago but are still around today. We practiced analyzing and identifying artifacts. And learned there are artifacts that look like they could be used for multiple different jobs.

Ask your student: What is an artifact that you saw today? What did it do?

OR

Old Fashioned Games

We learned that games kids would play were not like what we have today. Old Fashioned Games are often much simpler and homemade. We then got to try and play a lot of these games.

> **Ask your student:** What games did you play? What material were the games made out of?

Pioneer Crafts

Pioneers had many chores, often those chores were to make things to use. We learned how to make journals and dipped candles today. *These candles can be burned, however they will burn quickly and be messy. These candles make great birthday cake candles.*

Ask your student: Why would Pioneers make candles? What are the 2 parts of a candle?

What you'll need:

- 2 cups water
- 4 cups white sugar
- A medium saucepan
- Wooden spoon
- Mason jar
- Wooden skewer
- Clothespin
- Wax Paper

Directions:

- Pour water into saucepan and bring it to a rolling boil over medium heat
- Add sugar and start stirring
- Continue stirring until sugar has completely dissolved. This may take several minutes!
- Remove from heat and allow to cool while you prepare the jar and skewer.
- Pour the liquid into the jar. Careful! The liquid will still be hot.
- Dip your skewer into the jar several times. Allow the skewer to dry overnight on a piece of wax paper. * This will allow the seed crystals to form. Which are needed for other crystals to grow and attach to later*
- The next day, put the skewer back in the jar with the sugar water.
 Use your clothespin to keep the skewer up right in the jar. Clip it to the top and let it rest on the rim of the jar. Let this sit for several days at room temperature . As the water evaporates you'll see more and more crystals form on the skewer. After about 7 days you will have a nice collection of sweet crystals to eat!
